




ANNE MORROW LINDBERGH: YOU'LL HAVE THE SKY (Thursday, March 1 at 10:00 pm) Explore this film that brings one of the 20th century's best-loved writers out from the shadow of her often controversial husband, pioneering aviator Charles Lindbergh. An evocative portrait of a woman whose work continues to speak to readers today, and whose life is a key to understanding the changing worlds of aviation, women and celebrity in the 20th century.



PENNY: CHAMPION OF THE MARGINALIZED (Thursday, March 1 at 10:30 pm) A multi-dimensional portrait of Penny Cooper, a celebrated criminal defense attorney, art collector, supporter of female artists, and protector of the underdog. Cooper's life brims with stories mirroring the profound changes in our country from the 1940s to the present. View a collection of these moments as told by Cooper and the people who have been impacted by her dynamic spirit.



MANKILLER (Thursday, March 22 at 10:00 pm) The story of an American legend, Wilma Mankiller, who overcame rampant sexism and personal challenges to emerge as the Cherokee Nation's first woman Principal Chief in 1985 and served for three terms. While in office, she provided the foundation for the Cherokee Nation's current economic and cultural status as one of the most successful tribes in America.



INDEPENDENT LENS: DOLORES (Tuesday, March 27 at 9:00 pm) One of the most important, yet least known activists of our time, Dolores Huerta was an equal partner in founding the first farm workers union with Cesar Chavez. Tirelessly leading the fight for racial and labor justice, Huerta evolved into one of the most defiant feminists of the 20th century – and she continues the fight to this day, in her late 80s.



CELEBRATING 50 YEARS of MR. ROGERS


Fred Rogers brought a message that transcends generations of PBS viewers.



MR. ROGERS: IT'S YOU I LIKE (Tuesday, March 13 at 8:00 pm) Celebrate television's longest running series, *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*, with cast members and celebrities who have been influenced by this iconic children's program that still resonates with young and old today.




MR. ROGERS' NEIGHBORHOOD MARATHON (Sunday Mornings in March, 6:00 am to 8:30 am) Revisit this classic series throughout the month of March, on Sunday mornings. Spend time with Mr. Rogers and all his friends, including Daniel Tiger, who stars in today's popular PBS KIDS series inspired by Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood. PBS KIDS, past and present, are sure to enjoy this trip down memory lane.



JIMMY BUFFETT: BURIED TREASURE (Sunday, March 4 at 11:00 pm) Explore the musical roots of the popular performer during his "pre-beach" years through historical recordings, great stories and in-concert performances. Includes some of his earliest demo recordings, restored and being released for the first time.



QUEEN ROCK THE WORLD (Wednesday, March 7 at 11:00 pm) In 1977, Queen recorded their sixth album, *News of the World*, which included the songs "We Will Rock You" and "We Are the Champions" and also embarked on their biggest headlining U.S. tour with one aim: to break America. Music journalist Bob Harris and a film crew followed their journey as part of a proposed documentary that has remained incomplete and unreleased — until now. Forty years after the album and the tour, this lost documentary is pieced together for the first time.



CONCERT FOR GEORGE (Saturday, March 10 at 4:00 pm) Rock music's most celebrated musicians gathered at London's Royal Albert Hall on November 29, 2002 to pay tribute to one of their own, the legendary George Harrison, on the one-year anniversary of his death. On that magical night, Harrison's closest friends gathered to perform a collection of his music for a live audience. This soulful cinematic tribute captures an emotional gathering of musicians including Jeff Lynne, Paul McCartney, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, Billy Preston, and Ringo Starr.



THE BEE GEES ONE FOR ALL TOUR (Saturday, March 10 at 9:30 pm) Enjoy the tight harmonies of Barry, Robin and Maurice Gibb as they perform their greatest hits, as well as some rarely heard selections, in this fully restored, newly mixed and mastered concert recorded in Melbourne, Australia at the National Tennis Centre, in 1989.



CALL THE MIDWIFE, SEASON 7 (Sunday Evenings at 8:00 pm, beginning March 25) Poplar welcomes Lucille Anderson, the first West Indian midwife to be featured as a series regular. Tested as never before, the nuns and nurses face challenging issues from leprosy, tokophobia and stroke, to Huntington's chorea and unmarried mothers.
