



ONE NIGHT IN MARCH (Thursday, July 6 at 10:30 pm) Follow the story of a historic college basketball game that captured the national imagination and helped redefine a sport. Interviews, rare footage and archival photos transport viewers back to a tumultuous time in United States history, just as the Civil Rights movement began gaining momentum throughout the South. Recount how the Mississippi Bulldogs went on to play against Loyola University in the NCAA national championship despite an unwritten rule prohibiting all-white Mississippi collegiate athletic teams from competing against integrated teams.



FLYING TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH

Former Royal Marine Arthur Williams did not let the car crash that left him paralyzed deter his passion for flying and world travel. Despite his physical limitations, Williams uses a small prop plane to demonstrate how tiny aircraft are providing access to some of the planet's most remote places in the fascinating travel series.

FROM THE STREETS TO THE STAGE: THE JOURNEY OF FREDRICK DAVIS *(Thursday, July 13 at 10:00 pm)* Follow the story of a ballet dancer who overcame tremendous odds to achieve his dreams of dancing on stages around the world. Through intimate conversations with Fredrick Davis, as well as with the teachers, family and friends who helped shape his career, the film chronicles Fred's journey from his earliest and most difficult childhood memories to his busy life as a company member with the historic Dance Theatre of Harlem in New York.

GREAT PERFORMANCES AT THE MET: IDOMENEO *(Sunday, July 16 at 12:00 noon)* Music Director Emeritus James Levine conducts an extraordinary ensemble in *Idomeneo*, Mozart's early masterpiece of love and vengeance following the Trojan War.

REMEMBER ME *(Sunday, July 16, 23 and 30 at 10:00 pm)* When retiree Tom Parfitt (Michael Palin) stages a fall in his eerie Yorkshire home in order to escape into residential care, a chilling mystery unfolds, challenging police detective Rob Fairholme (Mark Addy) and care worker Hannah Ward (Jodie Comer) to risk everything they hold dear to unravel the truth. 3-Part Drama Series.

WEEKEND IN HAVANA *(Tuesday, July 18 at 8:00 pm)* Join Geoffrey Baer as he travels to Havana, where dancers, musicians, architects and writers invite him into their lives to experience the color, culture and history of a beautiful and seductive city only recently re-opened to Americans.

LOCAL INSPIRATION

LIBERTY OR DEATH *(Monday, July 3 at 10:00 pm)* Patrick Henry's impassioned plea at the second Virginia Convention of 1775, "Give me liberty or give me death," defined the American Revolution. This one-hour docu-drama captures this seminal moment in American history by balancing experts' commentary on the events preceding the second Virginia Convention with dramatic re-enactments of the historic moments that followed. ***Produced by WCVE.***

FIELD OF LOST SHOES *(Thursday, July 6 at 9:00 pm)* Explore this drama based on a true story of the American Civil War, culminating at the Battle of New Market in May 1864. A group of teenage cadets sheltered from war at the Virginia Military Institute must confront the horrors of an adult world when they are called upon to defend the Shenandoah Valley. Leaving behind their youth, these cadets must decide what they are fighting for.

THE LAST HUNT CLUBS *(Thursday, July 13 at 9:00 pm)* This haunting tour of ruined structures dotting the Eastern Shore of Virginia explores a little-known chapter of American history between the Civil War and the Great Depression. Learn about the wealthy northern industrialists that built exclusive sportsman's clubs, staffed and maintained by local southerners, along the remote barrier islands and coastal waterways from Delaware to Georgia.

CHESAPEAKE VILLAGES *(Thursday, July 13 at 9:30 pm)* As one of the important centers of the U.S. seafood industry, the Chesapeake Bay has for centuries supported watermen, businesses, and communities all along its shores. But catches of Chesapeake seafood are down, mostly due to poor water quality, and some bayside towns now face an uncertain future. *Chesapeake Villages* tells the stories of three such villages and their residents: Deal Island, Crisfield, and Hoopers Island.
